2. OVERVIEW OF THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE COOPERATION PROGRAMME (ARTICLE 50(2) OF REGULATION (EU) NO 1303/2013 AND ARTICLE 14(3)(A) OF REGULATION (EU) No 1299/2013)

Key information on the implementation of the cooperation programme for the year concerned, including on financial instruments, with relation to the financial and indicator data.

This is the second Annual Implementation Report for the Cooperation Programme Interreg V-A Slovenia-Hungary 2014-2020. It reports on the progress achieved under the CP in implementing the programme during the calendar year 2016. The report complies with Article 50(1) of Regulation (EU) No 1303/2013, which requires the Managing Authority to submit an Annual Implementation Report within fifth months (31 May) of the end of each full calendar year of implementation. According to the Article 14(1) of Regulation (EU) No 1299/2013 for the report submitted in 2017 the deadline is 30 June. The report was prepared by the Government Office for Development and European Cohesion Policy, acting as the Managing Authority of the programme in co-operation with its programme partners. The Monitoring Committee approved the Annual Implementation Report 2016 on 5th July 2017 in the frame of the 5th Monitoring Committee Interreg V-A SI-HU.

### **Designation process**

All activities regarding the designation process started already in 2015 and continued in 2016 with the preparation of the Description of Management and Control System (DMCS) and all required Programme guidelines. The DMCS with required annexes was submitted to the Audit Authority in the beginning of August 2016. The Audit Authority (AA), supported by external auditors as Independent Audit Body (IAB), conducted an audit (assessment) of compliance of designated authorities with the designation criteria for internal control, risk management, management and control activities and monitoring as set in Annex XIII to the Regulation (EU) No. 1303/2013. The IAB requested supplementing the DMCS in parts that were already sufficiently covered in programming period 2007-2013. MA supplemented the DMCS and produced additional manuals and guidelines according to IAB observations and resubmitted the DMCS to IAB for further checking. As provided in their report dated on 8 March 2017 the MA, the National Control Unit in Republic of Slovenia, national control units in Hungary and the CA designated for the programme comply with the designation criteria.

### **Selection of projects**

After lunching the Open call in December 2015 we had two submissions deadlines in year 2016. First deadline for submission of project proposals was 12 February 2016 and the second deadline was set to 25 July 2016. Till first deadline we received 46 applications, but after the assessment only one project from 1<sup>st</sup>



Priority axis had enough points to be approved. Main difficulties for applicants were administratively related where almost eighty percent of applications required supplementing which is not allowed according to programme rules, so programme rejected most of the applications. Till second deadline we have received 43 applications where administrative quality of applications improved significantly and most of the applications went through the quality assessment. At 3<sup>rd</sup> MC meeting in December 2016, no decision regarding selection of projects could be reached, since MC members from both participating countries in the programme were unable to reach the consensus about selection of projects. The final decision has been reached at 4<sup>th</sup> MC meeting on 16 January 2017 where members of Monitoring Committee approved five projects (4 from 1<sup>st</sup> PA and 1 from 2<sup>nd</sup> PA).

### Programme meetings and preparation of the manuals

Monitoring Committee members met twice in year 2016. Once on 25-26 May 2016 on 2nd MC meeting and second time on 5-6 December 2016 on 3rd MC meeting. Beside selection of project applications, on both meetings, MC members were informed on update of the programme implementation 2007-2013 and 2014-2020, they approved the Final Implementation Report OP SI-HU 2007-2013, the Annual communication plan for 2016, the Evaluation plan and the Annual Implementation Report 2014/2015 for CP Interreg V-A SI-HU. They were also acquainted with activities taken for promotion of programme and projects.

To ensure the efficient implementation of the Cooperation Programme two Bilateral programme group meetings with programme partners (National Authorities (NAs), CA, First Level Control (FLC)) were also organized in 2016, namely on 22 April 2016 and on 27 October 2016, both times in Maribor, to discuss topics related to implementation of the programme.

Within the both deadlines (February and July 2016) for the submission of project proposals in the Open Call of the CP Interreg SI-HU in 2016 altogether, 3 workshops intended for potential applicants were carried out where around 300 people participated. Within the first deadline two workshops were carried out, one on 13 January 2016 in Szombathely and on 18 January 2016 in Radenci. Within the second deadline only one workshop has been carried out on 14 June 2016 in Moravske Toplice. In frame of all workshops the Managing Authority and the Joint Secretariat presented the Cooperation Programme, Open Call and Application Package, the new electronic monitoring system (eMS), eligibility rules and requirements concerning information and communication. The first workshop was the one that was visited the most. During the Workshops we published questionnaires where we evaluated the level of knowledge of participants. Since the level of knowledge was low, the events were adjusted to suit the needs of the audience. In general participants liked the workshops and dis gain new knowledge, but this was not seen in the application process when projects were evaluated. In addition on the workshop in the frame of the second deadline also lessons learned, common mistakes and FAQs were presented. In order to help the project development, the JS/IPs carried out individual consultations with potential beneficiaries, in 2016 we carried out 36 consultations on face-to face basis and in additions many more over the phone.

During the reporting year 2016, several programme manuals were prepared by the Joint Secretariat in cooperation with the Managing Authority and relevant programme bodies. Those Manuals describe in detail the procedures needed for the management and control system of the programme, as well as the guidelines for project applicants/beneficiaries when preparing or implementing their projects. Some documents/manuals are aimed for the public and are therefore published on the website www.si-hu.eu (Manual for Beneficiaries including the Part for Reporting, Eligibility of expenditure etc.) others are covering the procedures for programme bodies and are therefore available on the programme's intranet (Manual on verification and validation of expenditure, Guidelines for using TA funds, Guidelines on State-Aid Identification and Monitoring etc.).

The programme uses the e-monitoring system (eMS) developed by Plot in cooperation with Interact. The



eMS system and its functionalities fully comply with the e-Cohesion regulatory requirements (according to final audit opinion). The development of the information system is still ongoing task, where the system is constantly updated with new and improved features. This activities were also ongoing in year 2016.

### **Publicity and communication measures**

The Managing Authotiry is also responsible for coordination of the tasks linked to the requirements on information, publicity and transparency as well as for the information and communication activities regarding CP as set out in Articles 115 and 116 of CPR. In year 2016 the programme organised one major event for the general public in 2016 together with the CP Interreg SI-AT under the auspices of the EC DAY initiative, called "Hike to the triple border". In frame of the one-day-tour the 150 participants passed 3 times 3 different borders in the region and visited 4 interesting EU co-financed CBC projects. The group went by bus from Maribor to visit the castle in Grad in Goričko. The route led the participants to Trdkova where they walked to the "tromejnik" the border stone between Slovenia, Hungary and Austria. The participants also visited the Apple House in Gornji Senik/Oberzemming, the museum of Slovenians from the Porabje region in Monošter/St. Gotthard (all results of the projects implemented from the OP SI-HU 2007-2013) and the castle Tabor in the nature park Raab, where the project 321 go, which is being implemented in the frame of the cross-border Cooperation Programme Interreg V-A Slovenia-Austria, was presented. Taking the possibility during the day the first ERDF Subsidy Contract in the new Programme was also signed by the Managing Authority and the Lead Partner in a special place (Tromejnik - Threelateral Border Stone). The Programme's website, respectively all three language versions were continuously updated, 23 news were published, 212 people signed up for the Programme Newsletter, who received e-newsletters 15 times, the website had 9.378 visitors. In October 2016 the Programme also made appearance in the social media with creation of a facebook profile. On the occasions of the public events participants received promotional items (notepad, pen, etc.). Moreover in frame of the programme, the uniform visual identity was used for all programme documents (e.g. invitations, handouts, presentations), on the programme website, on the promotional materials, in frame of the events and other activities.

### **Financial data**

In relation to the financial data, no costs have been certified and no payment claims have been forwarded to the Commission. In the previous years (2014-2016) the initial pre-financing payments were transferred from the European Commission (EC) to the Certifying Authority (CA) in the amount of 739.750,75 EUR. In 2016 the programme received 295.900,30 EUR ERDF funds for pre-financing. Prefinancing of the programme was not used, since it is intended for the reimbursement of first application claims when projects start to report and MA has to pay 100% of the claim according to legislation. Altogether 882.321,27 eur ERDF has been allocated to the one approved project which means that in 2016, the selected and contracted project represented 9% of the ERDF allocated to PA1 and 7% of all funds intended for implementation of projects under PA 1 and PA2. Seven Technical Assistance (TA) projects were approved to 100% of the ERDF allocation. At the programme level, the share of all contracted Union funds was 16%. All approved projects and projects of technical assistance are in implementation phase, where the pre-financing of activites cone from own budget of institutions cooperating in the projects. No advance payments have been made from ERDF funds.

In relation to the indicator data, the progress can be measured for the 1 approved projects within the Priority axis 1 (1st deadline of the Open Call) and for the Technical assistance (table 2). No projects fully implemented the activities by the end of 2016.



# 3. IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PRIORITY AXIS (ARTICLE 50(2) OF REGULATION (EU) NO 1303/2013)

## 3.1. Overview of the implementation

ID **Priority axis** Key information on the implementation of the priority axis with reference to key developments, significant problems and steps taken to address these problems **ATTRACTIVE** In 2016, under PA1 two call for proposals were carried out. The 1st deadline was opened between 18 December 2015 and 12 February **REGION** 2016. All together 32 projects applications under this priority have been submitted, requesting EUR 20,4 m ERDF which constituted ca. 200% of the available allocation for this priority. All the project applications have been forwarded to the assessment. After the administrative and eligibility check only 6 applications were eligible. Among 6 applications that were checked for quality, only one project from 1st Priority axis had enough points to be approved. The main reasons for low number of good projects lies in the fact that projects were not focused enough, did not contribute to the programme indicators or they did not build on cross-border cooperation. The subsidy contract with LP of this project GREEN EXERCISE has been signed in September 2016. The contracted ERDF amount is 882.321,27 EUR. However, till the end of the year no costs have been certified, no payment claims have been forwarded to the Commission. Doe no costs have been cerified on the project yet, project implemented several activities (kick off Event of the project, project coordination Meeting: 1 pcs, employed persons in the project: 12 persons, financial report: 1 pcs, project Communication Strategy: 1 pcs, appearance at AGRA in Gornja Radgona: 1 time (Goričko Nature Park Public Institute), project-profile on community page (Facebook): 1 pcs, project e-news: 1 pcs, procurement of trekking bikes at the Goričko Nature Park Public Institute: 10 pcs, procurement of microbus at the Őrség National Park Directorate: 1 pcs, preparation of technical specification of the Green Park in Moravske Toplice: 1pcs. At this stage of implementation no significant problems have been identified in the implementation of the PA1. Second deadline was set to 25 July 2016 and we have received till deadline 28 applications has been received under this priority, requesting 19,4 m ERDF, which constituted ca. 210% of the available allocation for this priority. Due to measures taken to avoid mistakes in preparation of applications (workshops, published FAQ on mistakes on the webpage, eMS has been upgraded, face-to-face meetings with potential applicants), 22 project applications passed eligibility check. After quality check, 7 project applications had enough points to be approved. The date of MC for selection of projects was 5 and 6 December 2016, but unfortunately, MC members could not reached common decision on which projects to approve. The final decision has only have been reached at next 4<sup>th</sup> MC meeting on 16 January 2017 where members of Monitoring Committee approved four projects from

Among 5 applications that were checked for quality, only one project had enough points to be postponed (where postponement means that project has to be improved in content according to recommendations received by assessors and resubmitted) none of them has been approved. No actions were financed within this Priority Axis in year 2016. First project under this priority axis has been selected at the beginning of year 2017.  Second deadline was set to 25 July 2016 and we have received till deadline applications has been received 15 project applications under this priority, requesting 3,9 m ERDF, which constituted ca. 120% of the available allocation for this priority. Due to measures taken to avoid mistakes in preparation of applications (workshops, published FAQ on mistakes on the webpage, eMS has been upgraded, face-to-face meetings with potential applicants), 12 project applications passed eligibility check. After quality check, 1 project application had enough points to be approved. The date of MC for selection of projects was 5 and 6 December 2016, but unfortunately, MC members could not reached common decision on which projects to approve. The final decision has only have been reached at next 4 <sup>th</sup> MC meeting on 16 January 2017 where members of Monitoring Committee approved one project from 2 <sup>nd</sup> PA).
		The main reasons for low number of good projects lies in the fact that projects were not focused enough, the general idea was ok, but after they made project to big (in financial and content sense) and they lost the basic concept of the planned project. Organisations that already cooperate did not upgrade the cooperation, they just sign the protocol, they are focusing on partners that they already know and finally a lot of project ideas could be implemented without cross-border cooperation.

- Consultancy/support to potential applicants, to partners of already submitted projects and face-to-face meetings with LP/PP of approved projects;
- JS members processed assessment procedures of projects submitted in the frame of the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> deadline for submission of applications;
- Preparation of the three Written procedures;
- Preparation of programme documents (Evaluation plan, Reporting Guidelines,
- one subsidy contract has been signed;
- no costs have been certified;
- no payment claims have been forwarded to the Commission;

At this stage of implementation no significant problems have been identified in the implementation of the PA3 (Technical Assistance), but due to the support applicants require for applications process, it is already seen that capacity and man-power at the level of Joint Secretariat is barely sufficient.

## 4. SYNTHESIS OF THE EVALUATIONS (Article 50(2) of Regulation (EU) No 1303/2013)

Synthesis of the findings of all evaluations of the programme that have become available during the previous financial year, including the name and reference period of the evaluation reports used

The Evaluation plan of the Cooperation programme Interreg V-A Slovenia-Hungary was discussed on the  $2^{nd}$  Monitoring Committee in May 2016 and after with supplements approved via written procedure in September 2016. According to the evaluation plan, four evaluations feeding into the respective Annual Implementation Reports are foreseen; two implementation evaluations and two impact evaluations.

According to the Evaluation plan the first evaluation focusing on the programme management structure and processes, project application, selection procedures and Communication Strategy is planned for the year 2017. The final results will be presented in AIR 2017.

# 5. ISSUES AFFECTING THE PERFORMANCE OF THE PROGRAMME AND MEASURES TAKEN (ARTICLE 50(2) of Regulation (EU) No 1303/2013)

a) Issues which affect the performance of the programme and the measures taken

There were no major issues affecting the performance of the programme in year 2016, however the programme has faced some issues which have affected the programme's implementation. The year 2016 was challenging for all programme structures, due to the overlapping of both financial periods, by closing the programme period 2007-2013 and preparing all the necessary documents/ procedures for designation of the programme 2014-2020. Despite the limited human resources involved in the activities covering both programme periods, the programme authorities managed to approve project and to implement activities related to two deadlines for submission, assessment and selection process.

All activities regarding the designation process started already in 2015 and continued in 2016 with the preparation of the Description of Management and Control System (DMCS) and all required Programme guidelines. The DMCS with required annexes was submitted to the Audit Authority in the beginning of August 2016. The Audit Authority (AA), supported by external auditors as Independent Audit Body (IAB), conducted an audit (assessment) of compliance of designated authorities with the designation criteria for internal control, risk management, management and control activities and monitoring as set in Annex XIII to the Regulation (EU) No. 1303/2013. The IAB requested supplementing the DMCS in parts that were already sufficiently covered in programming period 2007-2013. MA supplemented the DMCS and produced additional manuals and guidelines according to IAB observations and resubmitted the DMCS to IAB for further checking. As provided in their report dated on 8 March 2017 the MA, the National Control Unit in Republic of Slovenia, national control units in Hungary and the CA designated for the programme comply with the designation criteria. Programme fully implemented the e-Cohesion directive as it is already from the start of the programme possible to conduct all processed in electronic form with a single signon.

We could also mention, what has already been mentioned in the previous points, that in the frame of the first deadline we have had 76% of submitted project applications that had been rejected regarding eligibility. Most common mistake were: not all (mandatory) fields were filled in bilingually, not all (mandatory) fields in the Application Form were filled in, the Lead Partner was located outside the programme area, information presented in the application package documents was not consistent, the budget section was not filled in bilingually, the budget section was not completely filled, obligatory annexes were not submitted, the obligatory Annexes were not filled in completely. To avoid mistakes in preparation of applications, for the second deadline we implemented additional corrective measures such as organized workshops, published FAQ on mistakes on



the webpage, eMS has been upgraded to newer version where certain bugs were fixed and plugins for administrative check has been implemented, face-to-face meetings with potential applicants had been carried out. These measures turned out to be useful, since only 20% of all project applications submitted in the frame of the second deadline were ineligible after eligibility check.

Another important issue is understanding of the cooperation programme by MC delegations, where we have noticed interpretation differences by both MS delegations. This led to non-confirmation of projects in the 2<sup>nd</sup> deadline where no projects were confirmed. More clarification meetings between MS delegations had been organized and certain compromise has been found in order to proceed with the implementation of the programme.

Under the Open call for proposals (which is constantly open and project applicants can submit applications at any time between deadlines on a 24/7 basis), two deadlines have been published (deadlines are specified within the before mentioned single Open call) and in total 89 applications have been processed by end of 2016. Only one project was approved by MC under 1st deadline, whereas the decision on the selection of projects under 2nd deadline was postponed from December 2016 to January 2017 when five more projects were approved.

In 2016, the selected and contracted project represented 9% of the ERDF allocated to PA1 and 7% of all funds intended for implementation of projects under PA 1 and PA2.

Seven Technical Assistance (TA) projects were approved to 100% of the ERDF allocation. At the programme level, the share of all contracted Union funds was 16%. No disbursement has been made yet.

8 partners from the only approved project in 2016 come from Pomurska region (4) and Vas country (4), while Podravska region and Zala county were not yet involved in the implementation. The beneficiaries did not submit progress reports in 2016. Therefore, the progress in achievement of the programme objectives was assessed on the basis of planned outcomes of projects approved until 31 December 2016, and their expected contributions to the programme output indicators and specific objectives. The calculation of result indicators for priority axes is planned for 2018 and is thus not addressed in this report either.

## PA1: Attractive region

The expected result is developed sustainable touristic offer of the programme area based on the protection/conservation of natural & cultural resources and activation of local resources that would lead to increase of overnight stays and indirectly to increase in the number of local service providers, enterprises and locally available jobs. There seem to be major interest for cooperation within PA1; 70% and 65% of all received applications under 1st and 2nd deadline targeted this intervention area.

The approved project GREEN EXERCISE contributes by linking cultural &natural heritage and healthy life motives into new tourist products and packages. The project area will benefit from 9 Green parks and 5



biking routes that promote natural and cultural heritage on their way. New accommodation facilities another tourist related services and capacity building actions will be implemented.

Expected contribution of projects approved under 1st deadline to the programme output indicators:

- the project will contribute to the increase in the number of visits to supported sites of cultural and natural heritage and attractions with 3000 visitors, representing 30% of the target value of indicator C0009
- with 8 new CB-touristic products/services the 67% of the target value of indicator 6c.3 is to be achieved
- no contribution to the indicators 6c.2 (people participating in interpretation and educational events related to cultural and natural heritage) and 6c.4 (cycle tracks and footpaths) is indicated. Contribution to these indicators is expected from the 4 projects that were approved in January 2017.

From other applications submitted for the programme co-financing it is seen that project applicants in the programme area do not cooperate significantly, so similar applications were received from different applicants. To receive synergy between such project applications, JS increased counselling in stage of development of the projects, where applicants with similar ideas are targeted. JS will try to combine project applicants with similar ideas, so the repetition of projects is minimised with the objective to reach as many applicants as possible and to cover larger areas within the programme. The objective of the programme is also to increase the diversity of the projects, thus covering various topics with similar amount of co-financing.

After analysing the projects that were not successful in PA 1, the counselling process for applicants has been upgraded, where projects have been oriented towards achieving other output indicators, that are still missing to be reached.

### PA2: Cooperative region

The result is expected in higher level, more stable, as well as more extended legal and administrative cross-border cooperation among institutions and organizations from both sides of the border, more efficient public administration, delivery of quality public services and functional governance initiatives to effectively address the joint challenges manifested in the programme area. Areas to be addressed include environmental protection, energy efficiency, renewable energy, social services (social innovation), healthcare, employment, spatial planning, accessibility, civil protection, risk prevention and management, cultural cooperation...

Although 14 applications received under 1<sup>st</sup> deadline addressed this PA (30% of all received) and 5 were assessed for the quality, none was selected. The main reasons were: the general idea was ok, but after they made project to big (in financial and content sense) and they lost the basic concept of the planned project; organisations that already cooperate did not upgrade the cooperation, they just sign the protocol, they are focusing on partners that they already know and finally a lot of project ideas could be implemented without cross-border cooperation.

15 applications were received to 2<sup>nd</sup> deadline, 12 were assessed for their quality.

The programme received many applications targeted at 2<sup>nd</sup> priority, but content wise applications do not fulfil qualitative criteria and alignment with cooperation programme. From the assessments it was seen that applicants do not understand properly the intention of the programme priority, so the MA and JS discussed of using more targeted approach in the priority 2 for the next deadlines with special focus given understanding of the programme logic in 2<sup>nd</sup> priority.

MA and JS have made significant efforts to target priority 2 already on 3<sup>rd</sup> Workshop for applicants before 2<sup>nd</sup> deadline. The focus was given to more detailed explanation of Cooperation programme, especially in light of 2<sup>nd</sup> priority. Applicants were informed about what kind of projects programme expects within this



priority and also the invitations for the workshop have been sent to many different potential stakeholders with the region by using the databases available at National Authorities. Unfortunately, very few organizations responded to such invitation and even those that were participating were not willing to share project ideas or problems with other participants.

### Overall assessment of the achievement of the programme objectives

The progress in achievement of programme objectives by end of 2016 is modest. Implementation under PA1 started with one project, while PA2 was not yet activated.

Although the interest for cooperation is high and has been reflected in high number of received applications to both deadlines, only a few projects were eventually selected: 1 (2016) + 5 (2017).

Under the 1<sup>st</sup> deadline, only 24% of applications passed the administrative and eligibility check. The JS analyzed the most common mistakes and notified potential applicants to the 2<sup>nd</sup> deadline through website and informative workshop. The situation improved as 79% of applications under 2<sup>nd</sup> deadline passed this step and entered quality assessment. The MC decided that procedures will remain the same for the 3<sup>rd</sup> deadline.

Looking at expected contributions to the programme specific objectives of one approved project, the following is observed. With only one project approved (1st Priority Axis) the achievement of output indicators for both priorities can not be realistically predicted. (doe already at the beginning of the year 2017 another five projects were approved and the picture regarding the achievement of programme output indicators significantly improves).

#### PA3: Technical assistance

Seven TA projects have been approved in 2016. Achievement of targets for the TA projects is progressing well and in accordance with the plan. The staff and teams have been set up and operating. Information actions and support to applicants and beneficiaries is being implemented by all relevant bodies.

9.2. Specific actions taken to promote equality between men and women and to promote non-discrimination, in particular accessibility for persons with disabilities, and the arrangements implemented to ensure the integration of the gender perspective in the cooperation programme and operations (Article 50(4) of Regulation (EU) No 1303/2013 and Article 14(4), subparagraph 2, (d) of Regulation (EU) No 1299/2013)

The principles set out in the Article 7 of the Regulation (EU) no 1303/2013 were respected in the programme implementation in the following ways:

Respect of horizontal principles was included in the chapter 3.5 of the Implementation manual for beneficiaries – Part 1 (about the programme). Applicants were requested to self-assess in the application form the contribution of project proposal to these principles (positive, neutral or negative) and to describe/justify the selection.

The MC adopted the quality assessment criteria for the projects submitted to open call for proposals. The set of strategic criteria examines positive contributions of the project to promotion of equality between men and women and to equal opportunities and non-discrimination. The project demonstrating positive contributions to any of the two principles is assessed with 1 point for each one. The maximum score of points under strategic set of criteria is 39.

Respect of horizontal principles was promoted on three informative workshops for potential applicants.

Applicants self-assessed contributions to promotion of equality between men and women and non-discrimination mainly as positive in terms of respecting these principles in their implementation.

Respect of equal opportunities and non-discrimination is basically demonstrated by enabling access to project outputs and results to all interested target groups, with the intension to address also specific ones, such as minorities on both sides of the border, enabling access to cultural &natural sites and services to persons with disabilities. Overall, the projects address to a large extent the population in rural & peripheral areas and focus on opportunities for activation of their economic potentials that lag behind urban areas.

All projects intend to provide for equal opportunities for the men and women to be engaged in the projects teams and project activities, but in general do not increase this equality so the foreseen impact is neutral.

9.3. Sustainable development (Article 50(4) of Regulation (EU) No 1303/2013 and Article 14(4), subparagraph 2, (e) of Regulation (EU) No 1299/2013)

The principles set out in Article 8 of the Regulation (EU) no 1303/2013 were also taken into account in the programme implementation. In the Strategic Environmental Assessment for the programme has been prepared together with Ministry for Environment. The projects connected to road construction have been assessed from the sustainable mobility point of view.

Sustainable development as horizontal principle was included in the Implementation manual for beneficiaries – Part 1 (about the programme) in chapter 3.5 including concrete examples to be respected in all projects. Applicants were requested to self-assess in the application form the contribution of project proposal to sustainable development (positive, neutral or negative) and to describe/justify the selection.



The MC adopted the quality assessment criteria for the projects submitted to open call for proposals. The set of strategic criteria examines positive contributions sustainable development. The projects demonstrating positive contributions is assessed with 1 points. The maximum score of points under strategic set of criteria is 39.

Main contributions are expected from projects approved under PA1 that focus on valorisation of natural and cultural resources in sustainable cross border tourism offers that at the same time activate local knowledge and skills. The approved projects promote soft mobility (walking and cycling) and include awareness raising topics related to preserving cultural and natural heritage in the new tourist programmes being developed.

Majority of project applications do not show sustainability of projects after the project closure or do not provide sufficiently transparent method of monitoring it. This area will be specifically tackled in workshops where JS will presents the application process and areas of attention for future applicants.

The confirmed project does not involve building performance so there is no cost-optional level of energy performance.

9.5 Role of partners in the implementation of the cooperation programme (Article 50(4) of Regulation (EU) No 1303/2013 and Article 14(4), subparagraph 1, (c) of Regulation (EU) No 1299/2013)

The Monitoring Committee has been formed in respect of Article 5 of Regulation (EU) No 1303/2013. The process of selection and nomination of MC members has been coordinated by the National Authorities of Slovenia and Hungary.

The MC comprises members with voting rights and members in advisory capacity. The voting members are representatives of the national level and regional actors, which were nominated with a view to provide representation of all relevant sectors addressed by the Cooperation Programme.

The members in advisory capacity include representatives of the national and regional levels relevant for specific areas of interventions foreseen in the programme, civil society, economic partners, EC,...



The functioning of the MC has been effective. MC is supported by Joint Secretariat. MC members have access to relevant materials and information on the intranet. MC decisions are also published on the programme website along with the names of members of MC

MC members organise preparatory meetings on both sides of the border, where relevant topics are discussed and opinions aligned. Preparation also allows for more efficient and effective discussion at MC meetings, however it is seen that governmental members play significant role in work of the MC.

# 10. OBLIGATORY INFORMATION AND ASSESSMENT ACCORDING TO ARTICLE 14(4), Subparagraph 1 (a) and (b), of REGULATION (EU) No 1299/2013

10.1 Progress in implementation of the evaluation plan and the follow-up given to the findings of evaluations

Evaluation plan of the programme was prepared my the MA with the assistance of the JS at the beginning of the 2016 and approved by the MC in September 2016. Following its adoption it was sent to the EC for information through the System for Fund Management in the EU (SFC). It is available on the programme website www.si-hu.eu.

As stated in the Art 54 (1) of the CPR as well as in guidance documents from the EC the content of the evaluation plan concerns mainly the following areas: evaluations on the efficiency and effectiveness of the programme (foreseen in years 2017 and 2019) and impact evaluations (foreseen in years 2020 and 2022).

According to the evaluation plan the first evaluation will be carried out in the year 2017. First preparations and activities were done already in the 2016. The focus of the evaluation was on programme management and implementation, the project application and selection procedures and the Communication strategy. The evaluation was carried out on the basis of desk research, by using an online survey for all Lead Partners of the submitted projects in the frame of the first and second deadline of the Open Call and interviews of the programme structures. JS gathered data, needed for the evaluation, with the implementation of their activities: check of the administrative compliance and eligibility, qualitative assessment of the applications for the applications received within the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> deadlines of the open call. They also collected different types of data from the eMS system, made analyse about the project achievements (outputs and results indicators, deliverables) and about the financial data of the approved projects. The results of this evaluation will be included into AIR 2017.

# 10.2 The results of the information and publicity measures of the Funds carried out under the communication strategy

The first two years were a really active period in the life of the CP Interreg SI-HU Programme. After the EC approval (18 September 2015) the programme bodies speeded up the communication activities as well. First of all, the MA, in cooperation with the JS organised the opening conference, which was held on 20 October 2015 in Murska Sobota. In accordance with the Communication Strategy which was accepted on 24 November 2015 at statutory meeting of the Monitoring Committee and in accordance with the Annual Communication Plan 2016 several communication tools and channels were used in order to promote the Programme.

In year 2015 we focused more on the first communication phase. In frame of the opening conference three successfully implemented and closed projects financed out of OP SI-HU 2007-2013 presented their activities and results and we prepared the Final brochure of the OP SI-HU 2007-2013 too.



In year 2016 we entered the second communication phase which was set in the Communication Strategy. During this phase the primary task was not the dissemination of the results and best practices of the previous programming period but the promoting of the funding opportunities of the CP Interreg SI-HU Programme. In the frame of this work the Open Call of the Cooperation Programme Interreg V-A Slovenia-Hungary for the period 2014-2020 and the official Application Pack was published, which consists of the Implementation Manual for Beneficiaries, templates' of obligatory annexes (Lead Partner statement, Project Partner statement and Partnership Agreement) and the Subsidy Contract template.

The key communication channel of the current programme period was the programme website, as in the period 2007-2013, but of course other channels worked actively in order to contribute the implementation of the general communication objective described in the Communication Strategy. Programme-level events implemented in the last 2 years have contributed to the implementation of the specific - programme level - communication objective set out in Communication Strategy.

Activities set in the Communication Strategy are proceeding according to the approved Strategy furthermore the communication outputs which were set in the Communication Plan 2016 were fully carried out with minor delays at some point (signing the ERDF contract) however this delay could be handled within the planned time frame. In addition to this appropriate media coverage was also ensured at every event organised within the Programme in 2016.

To reach the specific communication objectives the activities of 2016 can be grouped referring to planned target audience whom the Programme would like to reach with the different communication activities and also grouped referring to the communication objectives which the Programme would like to reach:

Planned and implemented activities and reached results based on the list of communication tools:

### On-line communication:

- The Programme's website, respectively all three language-mutations were continuously updated. Until 31 December 2016 27 e-news were published and sent out as e-newsletter, 212 people signed up



for the Programme Newsletter, who received e-newsletters 27 times, the website had 79.188 visits, by 9.378 singe users.

- In October 2016 the Programme made appearance in the social media with creation of a facebook profile. In the short period till 31 December 2016 7 posts were published which have reached 464 people. In connection to these posts nearly 1000 interactions were carried out by visitors. The facebook page of the Programme had 76 likes till the end of this period.

### **Direct communication:**

- The opening conference was held on 20 October 2015 in Murska Sobota with more than 200 participants. The Member States participating in the cooperation program were represented at a high level, Mrs Alenka Smerkolj, Minister and Mr Zsigmond Perényi, Deputy State Secretary welcomed the participants.
- Within the 2 deadlines (February and July 2016) for the submission of project proposals in the Open Call of the CP Interreg SI-HU in 2016 altogether 3 workshops intended for potential applicants were carried out where more than 300 people participated. In frame of the workshops the CP, Open Call and Application Package, eMS, lessons learned, common mistakes and FAQs were presented.
- In order to help the project development, the JS/IPs carried out 36 individual consultations with potential beneficiaries.
- The programme organised one major event for the general public in 2016 together with the CP Interreg SI-AT under the auspices of the EC DAY initiative, called "Hike to the triple border". In frame of the one-day-tour the 100 participants passed 3 times 3 different borders in the region and visited 4 interesting EU co-financed CBC projects. Taking the possibility during the day the first ERDF Subsidy Contract in the new Programme was also signed by the Managing Authority and the Lead Partner in a special place (Tromejnik Three-lateral Border Stone).

## <u>Communication with media and PR / Media communication – advertising:</u>

- To all public events press was invited so they had the opportunity to promote the Programme in the local media (TV AS).
- In case of events the programme uses the roll-ups in order to visualise the programme.

### Publication activities:

- The programme issued two brochures, the whole Cooperation Programme and the Citizen's summary.

## Other (additional) tools:

- On the occasions of the public events participants received promotional items (notepad, pen, etc.)
- Moreover in frame of the programme, the uniform visual identity was used for all programme documents (e.g. invitations, handouts, presentations), on the programme website, on the promotional materials, in frame of the events and other activities.

The implemented information and publicity measures in the year 2016 involved several activities described in the chapter 6.2 Obligatory activities of the Communication Strategy.

The set budget for the implementation of the Communication Strategy for year 2016 was 20.000 EUR and the programme spent 19.200 EUR.

- 11.1 Progress in implementation of the integrated approach to territorial development, including sustainable urban development, and community-led local development under the cooperation programme

The integrated approach to territorial development as stated in the CP was observed also in selection of projects. The main goal of one approved project is a common cross-border promotion of extant touristic service related to cultural heritage and natural assets with an expansion towards emphasizing the importance of a healthy way of life, sustainable and environmentally friendly means of transport (especially cycling). The recreational parks (Green Parks) on both sides of the border in nine different places is plan to be establihed in order to promote the following topics: natural environment, protected natural assets, sustainable land-use and means of transport, healthy way of life and exercise.

The sustainable urban development and community-led local development under the cooperation programme are not used.

11.2 Progress in implementation of actions to reinforce the capacity of authorities and beneficiaries to administer and to use the ERDF

For the purpose of reinforcing the capacity of authorities, Joint Secretariat (JS) members and the Managing Authority (MA) attended several trainings in 2016 organised by Interact (Raising project quality, Financial and Project management, Indicators and data collection, Finance management camp). Also trainings regarding the eMS system were organised for the programme authorities and throughout the year regular meetings with the authorities (JS/MA) from CP Slovenia-Austria and CP Slovenia-Croatia were organised to share the experience and to reinforce the knowledge of programme management.

All the relevant guidelines for the beneficiaries were prepared and detailed information regarding the project implementation, reporting process and regarding the program rules in general were presented to the beneficiaries of the approved projects on the face-to-face meetings and throughout the 1st implementation period the beneficiaries received all the support needed from their JS Contract managers. The implementation of the project selected within the 1st deadline of the Open Call started in August 2016 and the 1st reporting period ended in January 2017.

It is seen that informatics knowledge is not only a problem for applicants, but for programme structures as well. To improve the capacity on this level, information system workshops were frequently organized and a lot of processes within programme bodies altered to adjust to electronic documents and communication. For the future also seminars for using different office programmes and more analytical tools are considered.

## 11.3 Contribution to macro-regional and sea basin strategies (where appropriate)

Within the application, the contribution to the relevant macro-regional strategies has to be described by the project partners, however in this regard no additional points are allocated to the projects within the quality check. The only project approved till end of the 2016 with acronym GREEN EXERCISE (within the 1st Open Call of the CP Interreg V-A Slovenia-Hungary) is contributing to the EU Strategy for the Danube Region (EUSDR), under Pilar 1 Connectaion the Danubien Region, PA 1.4 - Culture and tourism.
